On March 29, the State Board Review Team of Workforce Council (WEC), Instruction Commission (IC) and State Board staff met with the Center for its biennial Site Review. program for their 2nd year.



Leadership Circles

Débuted our new online mentoring program called "Leadership Circles" at the Women's Leadership Forum. This free service offers a place for secure conversations with real-time chats and stand-alone-modules for mentoring and even assists in the mentoring match. "It is important for women to be able to build strong and dynamic relationships and collaborations with other women in a secure environment that helps women to share their thoughts, feelings and ambitions," said Kellie Hale the Leadership Circles Administrator.
