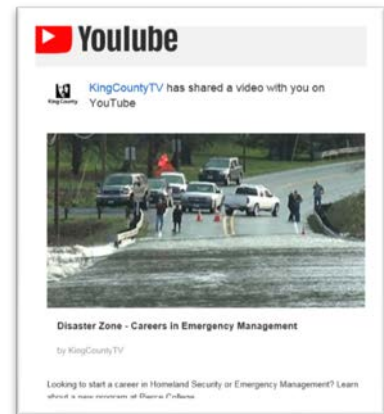


May 31 Interview on Disaster Zone w/Eric Holdeman

Eric Holdeman hosts a monthly show called “Disaster Zone” and asked the HSEM Center Director, Linda Crerar, to join him on the show in May to talk about the history and background of the establishment of the state’s Homeland Security-Emergency and

Management (HSEM) Bachelors of Applied Science Degree at Pierce College. The Program is graduating its first students on June 15.

The interview included a discussion about the increasing demand in the emergency management field for trained and experienced professionals and what role the Center has played through the past decade in addressing employers needs for well educated professionals in all of the public safety, security and emergency management career pathways. The video discussion provides information on the establishment of the original Associates and Certificate HSEM degrees, curriculum framework, faculty and internships and work experience opportunities. The next segment of the Program which will be taped in the coming month will bring the graduates from the Program together to share their perspectives about the Program and how their work experience opportunities and internships were important for employment and tips they would provide to someone who has an Emergency Management Degree and is looking for employment.

Center’s Strategic Framework and Development of 2018-2019 SBCTC Work Plan

The Center held its Strategic Planning session with the Board and staff on January 30. The Summary of the Strategic Planning session was utilized by the Center’s Board at their May 21, Board Meeting to complete the Center’s 2018-19 State Board Work Plan which will be submitted to the State Board on June 15. The Center’s primary goals are to provide effective leadership and coordination that rapidly responds to the interests of educational institutions and workforce training needs and accomplish this goal through working with a coalition of all 34 community and technical colleges (CTC), public agencies, and private sector organizations. The priorities discussed included; 1) Resources: Increase/diversify revenue sources to support the Center; 2) Program Support to build effective HSEM programs statewide; and 3) Infrastructure: to create a consistent statewide CoE-HSEM brand and operations platform that communicates and markets our program services and resources using outreach and education activities that may utilize the Center’s website, social media, webinars, and other multi-media platforms and opportunities.

For the Center’s 2018-19 Work Plan we will add this year a collaboration with the Center of Excellence for Agriculture to host a “Food Defense Summit” in partnership with the WA State Department of Agriculture. This Forum will be held at Walla Walla Community College on October 26th, 2018. The topic for this next year’s Securing the Supply Chain Forum will be on health/medical car supply chain security and the Center for Allied Health in Yakima will join with our other partner Center’s, Global Trade/Supply Chain and Agriculture, to host this event

At the end of the discussion Ryann, Steve, Ken and Laura agreed to continue to work together to see how the CTC's existing safety, security and EM education programs and faculty can address the establishment of a College Safety Officer Certification/Certificate that would provide the critical training needed for our school safety officers but also give them college credit that could be utilized towards a degree in one of the public safety, security and emergency management career fields.

Thanks go to all of our 34 college's Safety, Security and Emergency Management professionals for helping to keep our campuses safe learning environments and we look forward to reporting back to all of you the work that Ryann, Steve and our CJ Program managers and faculty do to help their SSEM colleagues on our campuses.
