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Center's 2023-2024 Work Plan

The Center submitted its 2023-2024 work plan to the State Board. The work plan consists of focus areas in economic development, sector strategy, education innovation/efficiency, along with supply and demand. Our annual work plan compromises of activities in areas such as partnerships/collaborations with other Centers of Excellence, career connected pathways, women in leadership, and public safety/criminal justice program enhancement. Each of our activities are required to meet certain expectations and outcomes for our stakeholders, workforce development and industry.

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Site Review with SBCTC Planned

After discussions with the State Board for Community and Technical Colleges (SBCTC), the Center has identified and finalized the date for our site review which will be held online. The purpose of the site review is to learn about how each Center works to understand and improve relationships between their industry sector and community technical colleges and find ways to help promote the Center as well as encourage adoption of similar practices by other Centers. Our site review will be held on January 16, 2024.

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CHMURA JobsEQ Participation

Our Center is continuing efforts with other Centers to support our Workforce Data Pilot which identifies, extracts, formats and delivers workforce and related data, using the Chmura JobsEQ RTI platform. This project demonstrated the use and effectiveness of occupational, industry and other data to the workforce education and training system. Ten Centers of Excellence are participating in the pilot project and will engage in the development of the project rubric, collection of data, and the report of findings and recommendations at the end of the pilot. Data was sent to Deans and Fire Chiefs/Fire Marshalls, and individuals in Occupational Safety and Health, and Criminal Justice.



Fire Service Surveys Created and Sent out

The Center collaborated with instructors from Pierce College, Columbia Basin College, and Spokane Community College to create industry and educational surveys which were sent out to fire chiefs and educators within the state.



Partnership with SBCTC/Fire Marshall's Office

The Center is working together with SBCTC and the Fire Marshall's office to combine efforts and participate in the Fire Service Training and Education Workgroup.



Renaming the Center

The Center has existed for 15 years and was established after 9/11, when the federal Homeland Security Department was established. People often hear our name and assume we are affiliated with the federal government, although we are a part of Washington State's Community and Technical Colleges Centers of Excellence. Building community resilience has always been our mission and we believe that *resilience* needs to be part of our new name. Our advisory board has been working to identify a new name and we will be sharing that as part of our 2024 anniversary celebration.



Continuation of CJ Workgroup

The Center continues to work with the CJ Program workgroup to re-establish it in order to identify current programs and faculty/staffing changes. The meeting for the workgroup has not been set up as of yet, but will take place virtually to receive updates on current pathway programs at each college.

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Planning for 2024 Women's Leadership Symposium

Planning has already started for the new Women's in Leadership Symposium dated for May 2024, which will also include the celebration of the Center's 15th anniversary.



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Continuing the Jamye Wisecup Scholarship

Center Advisory Members continue to provide the leadership that supports the Jamye Wisecup Scholarship endowment fund which has raised \$11,976.11. The fund supports students in the all-hazards emergency management career pathway programs. Celia Taylor (advisory board co-chair) will be one of the leads along with Jasmine May and Kellie Hale in developing an agenda with the advisory board to continue our efforts to raise funds for the scholarship.
